## ULTIMATE OUTCOME:

Improve economic well-being for women and men affected by Typhoon Haiyan in Iloilo Province.

## EXPECTED RESULTS:

1. Increased participation of targeted women and men affected by Typhoon Haiyan in sustained and resilient economic activities
2. Improved access to financial and business development (BDS) for targeted microenterprises affected by Typhoon Haiyan, particularly those owned/operated by women

## WE DO THIS BY:

1. Livelihood capacity building trainings in fishing, farming, and alternative livelihoods
2. Increase capacities in restoring productive assets
3. Establish protective livelihood mechanisms in DRR and CRM
4. Improve access to markets, financing opportunities and business development services.
